These aboriginals call themselves the son of the soil. Their economy is mostly dependent on the forest produce. The tribals are concentrated on the border region of he state. Spread across the eastern and southern regions, tribal communities like the Bhils, Rathwas, and Dungri Garasias contribute to the cultural vibrancy of the state. The Bhils, one of the largest tribal groups, showcase a tapestry of vibrant dance forms and folk music, embodying a connection to the land and nature. The Rathwas, known for their colorful attire and unique rituals, infuse their surroundings with a vivid cultural palette.

From the agricultural practices of the Chaudharis to the coastal lifestyle of the Koli Patels, each community weaves its own narrative into Gujarat's cultural fabric.
