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ABSTRACT

Montalvo and Ravallion (2009) examined poverty reduction in China and emphasised the role of the primary sector in explaining the country's progress in reducing absolute poverty. Their work indicates that the agricultural sector can make an important contribution to poverty reduction when growth reaches rural households.

Vij (2013) examined the role of social protection programmes, including the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (MGNREGS), in supporting economically vulnerable groups. The study indicates that social protection can play an important role in reducing vulnerability, although disadvantaged communities may still experience gaps in access and implementation.

Chaudari and Mukesh (2017) considered differences in consumption patterns between the population as a whole and disadvantaged sections of society. Their discussion also draws attention to the multidimensional nature of poverty, including unemployment, indebtedness, poor health, educational disadvantage, inadequate housing and unfavourable environmental conditions.

Zheng et al. (2021) discussed the relationship between culture and sustainability and pointed out that evidence on this relationship can be difficult to measure because of methodological differences between cultural and sustainability research. This suggests that rural sustainability should be understood in a broader social and cultural context rather than only through economic indicators.

IV. RURAL DEVELOPMENT AND POVERTY IN INDIA

Agriculture continues to have a major influence on India's rural economy and social structure. Although the contribution of agriculture to national GDP has changed as other sectors have expanded, a large rural population still depends on agriculture and allied activities for income and employment.
